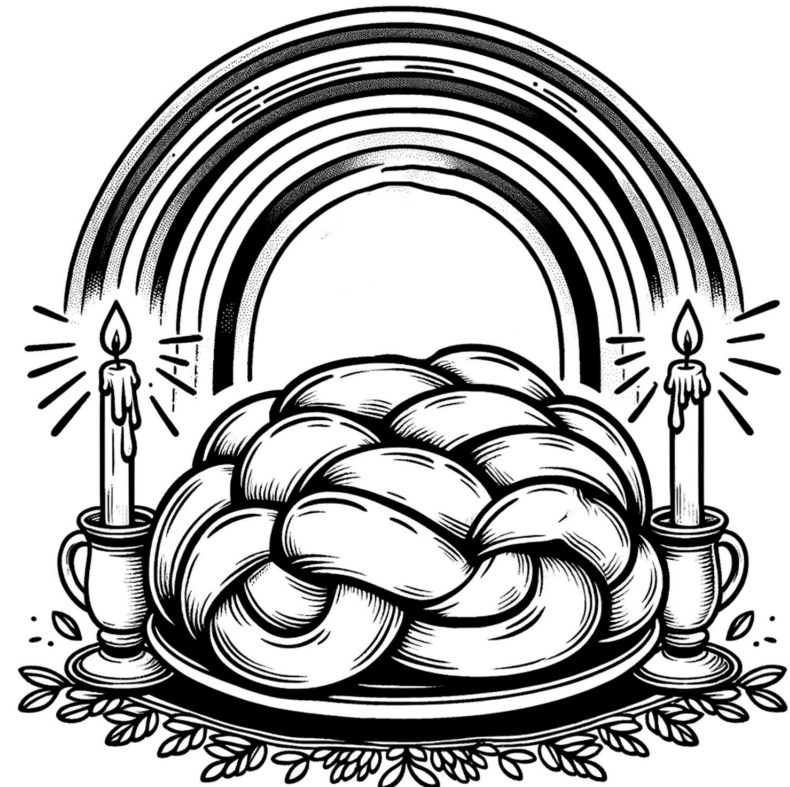

This Week's Parashah

Korach, a Levite, joined by members of the
tribe of Reuben, leads a rebellion against
Moses and Aaron. They accuse Moses and
Aaron of raising themselves above the com-
munity of Israelites, all of whom are holy.
Moses rebukes Korach for aspiring to privi-
leges above those reserved for the Levites.
He tells Korach that God will choose who is
holy, and that this will be demonstrated to
the people. The 250 rebels, together with
Moses and Aaron, offer incense in a fire-pan
to God before the Tent of Meeting. God
threatens to destroy the entire community,
but Moses intercedes. Moses tells the people
that if the earth swallows up the rebels, it
will be a sign that Moses is God's chosen
leader. The ground opens and all of Korach's
people are swallowed up. A fire destroys the
250 rebels in his party. The people protest
that Moses and Aaron are responsible for the
deaths of the rebels. God is angered and
prepares to destroy the Israelites, but Moses
tells Aaron to provide atonement for them.
A total of 14,700 Israelites perish.

Today's Haftarah

The prophet Samuel gathers the people of
Israel together at Gilgal, where he speaks
to the nation about the king whom God
has appointed for them. When the people
had demanded of Samuel a human king
who would rule over them, he knew that no
man's rule could replace the rule of God.
But God had instructed Samuel to anoint
Saul as King of Israel. Now, Samuel cau-
tions the people not to neglect God and
the Torah, because God is the true power
behind the throne. It was God who rescued
the Jewish people from Egypt, and from
Sisera and the Philistines. Whenever the
Israelites have turned away from God and
worshiped other nation's gods, the God of
Israel has sent enemies to conquer them.
Even with a human king like Saul, the Jew-
ish people will not survive unless they re-
member to fear God, to worship God, and
to listen to the voice of God. Both Samuel
and Moses are faced with those who would
reject their leadership. Moses and Samuel
have often been linked in tradition. This
week's readings underscore this link:
selfless service on behalf of justice.
