This Week's Parashah

As the Israelites are ready to enter the
Promised Land, Moses begins to recount the
events of the journey. He tells of the difficul-
ties in governing the Israelites as they jour-
neyed from Egypt. Judges were appointed
to rule over disputes. Moses presents three
rules for making fair judgments: "You shall
not show partiality...Hear out the small and
great alike...Do not be influenced by anyone,
for the judgment belongs to God." Moses
continues recounting the journey and the
Israelites' behavior as they approached Can-
naan. He retells the story of the spies that
were sent ahead. The people had lost faith
upon hearing the details of the spies' report
of giants and a seemingly unbeatable ene-
my. It was this event that prevented that
generation from ever entering Promised
Land. Of that generation, only Caleb, who
had given an encouraging report of the
Land, and Joshua, who was to be the next
leader, will live to enter Canaan. The parsha
closes with Moses naming Joshua as his suc-
cessor.

Today's Haftarah

Isaiah warns Jews of all subsequent gener-
ations of the moral transgressions that can
lead to the downfall of the Jewish people.
God does not want nor need empty ritual if
the people fail to lead ethical lives. "Learn
to do well. Search for justice, aid the op-
pressed, be true to the orphan, plead for
the widow," says Isaiah. "What use to me
are all of your sacrifices?" This haftarah is
always chanted on the Shabbat just before
the fast day of Tisha B'Av and is the final of
three haftarot that rebukes Israel for its sin-
fulness. The prophet Isaiah offers the possi-
bility that, if Israel returns to God in sincere
repentance, there can still be redemption.
This is why it is called Shabbat Hazon - it
gives a clear prophecy (hazon) of what is
to come. Following Tisha B'Av, the haftarot
form another series, this time leading up to
Rosh Hashanah. These are called the haftar-
ot of Consolation, each offering the mes-
sage that despite their disloyalty, God
offers reward and compassion in exchange
for repentance.
