This Week's Parashah

This week's Torah portion, concluding the Book of Leviticus, is filled with blessings and curses. The blessings are a reward for adhering to God's commandments. "If you walk in My statutes and keep My commandments, and do them, then I will give you rains in their season, and the land shall yield her produce...and you shall eat your bread until you have enough and dwell in your land safely, and I will give you peace in the land, and you shall lie down, and none shall make you afraid" (Leviticus 26:3-7). The curses, on the other hand, are a consequence of disobedience to God. "But if you will not hearken unto Me, and will not do all these commandments, and if you reject My statutes, and your soul abhors My ordinances, I will do this to you: I will appoint terror over you...and you shall sow your seed in vain, for your enemy will eat it...I will make your cities a waste...and I will bring the land into desolation...and I will scatter you amongst the nations...and I will send a faintness into your heart in the land of your enemies, and the sound of a driven leaf will chase you away" (Leviticus 26:21-46). God does make known, however, that the People of Israel will eventually repent. At that point, God will remember the covenant with Jacob, Isaac, and Abraham, and once again will watch over the people who will live in peace. The parashah concludes with verses on the redemption of tithes, and with the statement: "These are the commandments that the Lord gave to Moses for the Israelite people on Mount Sinai."

Today's Haftarah

Jeremiah brings a warning to the Jewish people about the disasters to befall them if they do not follow the Torah. One who places trust in mortals rather than in God is compared to "a lone tree in the wilderness," a tree forced to endure the harshness of the arid desert. But the person who puts trust in God is blessed; God will be security. That person is like "a tree that is planted near water, which will spread its roots alongside brooks...whose foliage will be ever fresh, who will not worry in years of drought and will never stop producing fruit." The Haftarah ends with a message of hope. No matter how dark the present, the covenant of the Patriarchs remains intact; hope and healing will yet come, for God is our salvation. This week's Haftarah parallels the Torah reading in warning the Jewish people that disaster is likely to befall them if they do not follow the teachings of God as expressed in Torah. Both the Torah reading and Haftarah describe the consequences of not following the Torah and blessings of a life guided by God's teachings.
