This Week's Parashah

Korach, a Levite, joined by members of
the tribe of Reuben, leads a rebellion
against Moses and Aaron. They accuse
Moses and Aaron of raising themselves
above the community of Israelites, all of
whom are holy. Moses rebukes Korach
for aspiring to privileges above those
reserved for the Levites. He tells Korach
that God will choose who is holy, and
that this will be demonstrated to the
people. The 250 rebels, together with
Moses and Aaron, offer incense in a fire-
pan to God before the Tent of Meeting.
God threatens to destroy the entire
community, but Moses intercedes. Mo-
ses tells the people that if the earth
swallows up the rebels, it will be a sign
that Moses is God's chosen leader. The
ground opens and all of Korach's peo-
ple are swallowed up. A fire destroys
the 250 rebels in his party. The people
protest that Moses and Aaron are re-
sponsible for the deaths of the rebels.
God is angered and prepares to destroy
the Israelites, but Moses tells Aaron to
provide atonement for them. A total of
14,700 Israelites perish.

Today's Haftarah

This is the last chapter in the Book of Isaiah
and it is the Prophet's final plea for Israel's
complete loyalty to God. These are the ex-
iles whom Cyrus of Persia had permitted to
return. They are now completing the re-
building of the Jerusalem Temple. The
work had taken a long time because of Sa-
maritan opposition to the returned exiles.
Altogether the rebuilding had taken about
twenty-three years (538-515 B.C.E.) Now
that the Temple is to be reopened, Isaiah
reminds the people about God's expecta-
tions of them. They must fully understand
that God's dwelling is actually the whole
wide world. The Temple is therefore only a
symbol of God's presence among the peo-
ple. But His presence is hardly limited to
the Temple alone. The purpose of the Tem-
ple shall be to inspire men to reverence.
The Temple worship must lead to ethical
living. The bringing of sacrifices is only the
means toward the larger goal of righteous-
ness in everyday life. If the people shall in-
deed fulfill this high ethical goal, then Zion
shall be beautifully transformed. And Jeru-
salem shall become a model city to the
world. This last chapter in the Book of Isai-
ah is assigned for Rosh Hodesh Sabbaths
because it contains the theme expressed in
Verse 23: "And, it shall come to pass, that
from one new moon to another, shall all
humans come to worship before Me"
