This Week's Parashah

Pinchas is the son of the priest Eleazar. His zeal in slaying the Israelite man and the Midianite woman in last week's parasha wins him the reward of priesthood for himself and his descendants for all time. Moses and Eleazar take a census of all male Israelites over twenty years of age. As God had decreed, all adults who had been a part of the first census (except for Moses, Joshua, and Caleb) died in the desert on the journey toward the Promised Land. Five daughters of Zelophehad protest the injustice that land was not given to their family solely because their father had no sons. God advises Moses that the plea of the daughters is just. God tells Moses to ascend the mountains to see the land given to the Israelites. Although he may see the land, he will never enter it. Moses is told to ordain Joshua the son of Nun as his successor. The portion concludes with instructions for the daily, Sabbath, monthly, and festival sacrifices to be brought before God.

Today's Haftarah

The Book of Jeremiah opens with the divine call to Jeremiah: Behold I have put My words in your mouth! See, I have appointed you this day [to speak] to nations and kingdoms, to uproot, to pull down, to destroy, to root out, to build and to plant. The prophet's words will contain harsh criticism of the people and foretell Jerusalem's destruction. But he will also bring the Jewish people a message of peace and hope. This is the first of three Haftarot traditionally read during the weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av, which commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. Appropriately, this morning's Haftarah comes from the Book of Jeremiah, the prophet who witnessed the destruction of the First Temple at the hands of the Babylonians in 586 B.C.E. It is believed that the Book of Lamentations, read on Tisha B'Av, was penned by Jeremiah.
