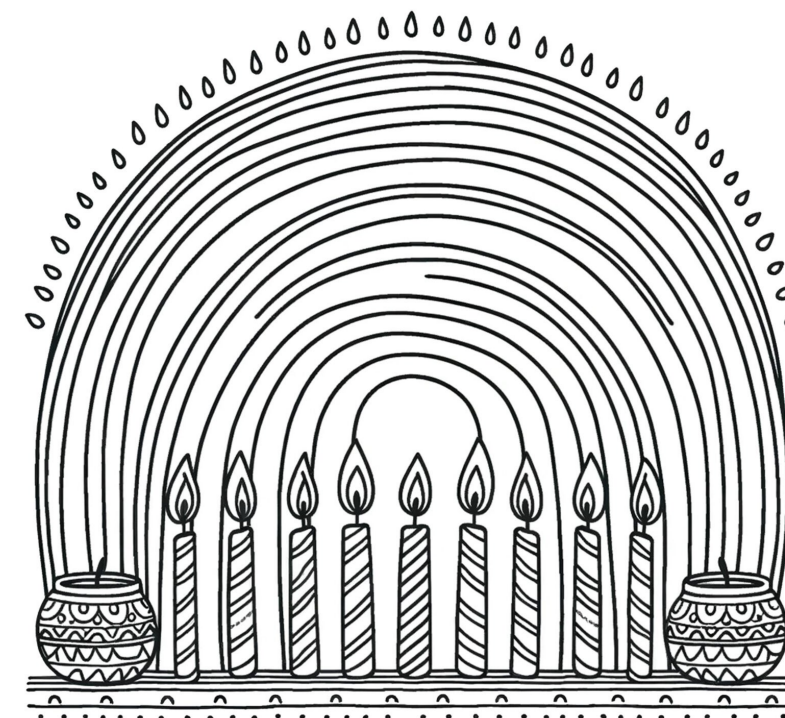
Welcome to Congregation Beth Shalom!

This Week's Parashah

Joseph is in prison, forgotten by the cupbearer, whose dreams he interpreted two years earlier. Pharaoh has two dreams that his wise men cannot explain; the cupbearer finally remembers Joseph, who is brought before Pharaoh to explain the dreams. The two dreams bring the same message: Egypt will enjoy seven years of plenty followed by seven years of famine. Pharaoh appoints Joseph to the second highest post in Egypt. He will collect grain during the seven years of plenty, and distribute it during the ensuing famine. The famine reaches to Canaan and Jacob sends all of his sons, except Benjamin, to obtain food in Egypt. They come before Joseph who recognizes them. However, they do not recognize him. Joseph accuses the brothers of spying. He orders them to return to Canaan and bring back to him the brother that has remained. Jacob does not want to send Benjamin to Egypt, afraid of losing his youngest son. Only when starvation threatens, does Jacob allow him to go. As the brothers go on their way, they are pursued and accused of stealing Joseph's goblet. The goblet is found in Benjamin's sack. The special reading for Rosh Chodesh is read for the seventh Aliyah. The Maftir Torah reading describes the offerings made on the sixth day after completion of the Tabernacle. It is the portion read on the sixth day of Chanukah. This is one of the few times in the Jewish calendar that we read from three Torahs.

Today's Haftarah

Zechariah relates a vision of Joshua, the Kohen Gadol (High Priest), standing before God and Satan. Joshua is dressed in dirty clothing, representing his defilement for failing to uphold the word of God. God is ready to forgive Joshua, to clothe him in fresh garments, if Joshua will walk in the Lord's ways and safeguard the Jewish teachings. An angel appears to the prophet and shows him a menorah made entirely of gold, having seven lamps each filled with the oil from two nearby olive trees. The vision symbolizes God's constant care. The prophet Zechariah urges his fellow exiled Israelites to rejoice and sing because God is with them. At the conclusion of the Haftarah, Zechariah shares his vision of a seven-branched menorah for the Temple. This serves as a link to Chanukah and its nine-branched menorah, the *chanukiyah*.
