This Week's Parashah

This portion contains a tally of all the precious metals that were used in the construction of the Tabernacle, along with detailed descriptions of how the priestly garments were made. It contains explicit instructions for how to set up the Tabernacle, Moses sets it as God has commanded. The language used to describe this project; "work", "completed" and "blessed"- echoes the language that the book of Genesis used when God created the world. Finally, God's cloud, the visible sign of God's presence, descends upon the Tabernacle and becomes a signal for the People of Israel to move forward on their journey through the wilderness. Today's Haftarah

The Haftarah from the Book of Ezekiel reviews the Pesach sacrifices as the Prophet describes the restored temple in Jerusalem. The Haftarah describes the festival of Pesach envisioned for the new Temple period, stressing the purification at that time. These readings are intended to set our mood and thoughts on the coming Festival of Pesach. As our preparations for Pesach intensify, both the Maftir reading and the Haftarah focus on rituals connected with the festival. The Maftir and Haftarah each reflect two historical poles in Jewish History: the Maftir, describing the first Pesach, and the Haftarah, a vision of the Pesach of the future, when Israel is restored to its homeland.
