This Week's Parashah

At the end of last week's parsha, we read that Israelites Zimri and Cosbi were up to no good; Pinchas, son of the priest Eleazar, took it upon himself to enact justice, killing the two lovers. For his zealousness, he wins the reward of priesthood for himself and his descendants for all time. For the past 3,000+ years, there has been debate on whether or not Pinchas' act was justified. Everyone agrees that Zimri and Cosbi were deserving of discipline, but is it up to private citizenry, or even self-selected leaders, to take matters into their own hands? In tractate Sanhedrin, the Talmud teaches, "The law may permit it, but we do not follow the law." (The Rabbis were against capital punishment.) Some call Pinchas a hero, others see him as an overzealous nut. Either way, perhaps it is better for proper authority to step in to assess a situation instead of relying on vigilante justice. Parshah continued

Moses and Eleazar take a census of all male Israelites over age 20. Five daughters of Zelophehad protest the injustice that they were not to inherit their father's land simply because he had no sons. Moses brings the women's plea to God, who agrees that it is just.

Today's Haftarah

The special haftarah this week is the first of a series of haftarot preparing us for Tisha B'Av (August 7), which commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. Appropriately, this morning's Haftarah comes from the Book of Jeremiah, the prophet who witnessed the destruction of the First Temple at the hands of the Babylonians in 586 B.C.E. It is believed that the Book of Lamentations, read on Tisha B'Av was penned by Jeremiah. In today's haftarah, Jeremiah harshly criticizes the people of Jerusalem and warns them that the city, including the Holy Temple, will be destroyed. But he also brings the Jewish people a message of peace and hope.
