

This Week's Parashah

You know this from the musical – Joseph is Rachel's first son, and therefore Jacob's favorite. Joseph's brothers envy him because he is favored and hate him because of his arrogant dreams. In one dream, the brothers' sheaves of grain bow down to Joseph's, and in another, the sun, the moon, and eleven stars bow before him. Joseph's brothers plot to kill him. Reuben, however, convinces his brothers to throw Joseph into a pit instead. When Reuben is away, the brothers sell Joseph to a caravan of merchants. They dip Joseph's coat in goat blood and bring the coat to Jacob, who now assumes that Joseph is dead. There is a brief interlude telling the story of how Tamar, Judah's son-in-law must use trickery at the risk of her own life to force Judah to fulfill his duties as head of the household. The story picks up Joseph being sold to Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh. Joseph does well here until Potiphar's wife tries to seduce him. When Joseph resists her, she accuses him of attacking her, and Joseph is thrown in prison. In prison, Joseph meets Pharaoh's wine steward and baker, and he interprets their dreams. Joseph's interpretations are correct.

Today's Haftarah

The prophet Amos calls upon the people to account for their deeds during the reign of King Jeroboam II (784-748 BCE). He admonishes the people for their corruption, greed, inhumanity to each other and other unethical behavior. For this, says Amos, the people will be punished. The opening verse of the Haftarah is translated: "For three transgression of Israel, yea, for four, I will not reverse it. Because they sell the righteous for silver and the needy for a pair of shoes." In this verse we are told that the innocent are declared guilty for a bribe, or the poor sold into lives of slavery for debts. The sale of an innocent man provides the connection to the Torah portion through the story of Joseph, himself an innocent victim of hatred and slander.
