This Week's Parashah

Shemini begins on the eighth day of the ordination ceremonies for the Kohanim- Aaron and his sons. Aaron brings a sin offering and a burnt offering, followed by a sacrifice of well-being, as God has commanded. After these are offered, Moses and Aaron enter the Tent of Meeting. When they come out, they bless the people and God's Presence appears before the people. Nadav and Avihu, two of Aaron's sons, bring an offering before God, though God had not instructed them to do so. The two men are immediately killed by fire. Moses explains God's actions to Aaron, saying that the deaths of Nadav and Avihu demonstrate the responsibility of priests to do only what God commands. God speaks to Aaron, warning him that the Kohanim must not be intoxicated when they come to the Tabernacle. The Torah portion continues with laws concerning Kashrut. Only mammals with a split hoof and that chew their cud are permitted, as are fish with both fins and scales. Birds of prey are forbidden, although certain insects are actually permitted. The portion ends with God's instruction to the Israelites to "sanctify themselves and be holy."

Today's Haftarah

King David brought the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem after capturing the city from the Jebusites in 1000 BCE. When Uzzah tries to take hold of the ark, God strikes him dead, apparently because Uzzah did not treat the ark with proper reverence. King David now hopes that a Temple will be built in Jerusalem, which will permanently house the Ark of the Covenant. He discusses this with the prophet Natan, who tells David that the Temple will not be for him to build. There is a connection between the Torah reading and this week's Haftarah. The Torah portion describes the consecration of the tabernacle in the wilderness, while the Haftarah tells of the transportation of the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem.
