This Week's Parashah

In the first of today's two portions, God instructs Moses and Aaron in the slaughtering and preparation of a red heifer. Its ashes are to be mixed with water and used for purifying the Israelites who become impure through contact with a corpse. Any unclean person who refuses to purify himself will be cut off from the congregation. Moses' two siblings both die in this section of the Torah. The Israelites arrive in the Wilderness of Zin, and there Miriam's life ends. The people are without water and complain to Moses and Aaron. God tells Moses and Aaron to speak to a rock, which will provide the people with water. Instead, Moses strikes the rock. Water comes forth, but God says to Moses and Aaron, "Because you did not believe in Me to sanctify Me in the eyes of the Children of Israel, you will not bring them to the Land that I have given them." In the second of today's portions, Balak, King of Moab, sees the victory of the Israelites over the Amorites, he becomes alarmed. Fearing that the Israelites are too powerful to defeat in battle, Balak sends messengers to summon the prophet Balaam.

He is to come to Moab and curse the Israelites so that the Moabites can defeat them. After consulting God, Balaam proceeds to speak God's words in blessing of Israel. Balak is enraged by this. He takes Balaam to a different place, hoping that Balaam will curse the Israelites from there. At each place, however, Balaam speaks the words of God, blessing the Israelites. Finally, Balak dismisses Balaam. Before returning to his home, Balaam prophesies the destruction of Moab and the neighboring countries.

Today's Haftarah

In this Haftarah, the Prophet Micah reminds the people what God did for them at the time that He made them an Am Kadosh (a Holy Nation): "I brought you up from the land of Egypt, I redeemed you from the house of bondage, and I sent before you Moses, Aaron and Miriam." And what is it that God requires of His people in return? "Only to do justice, to love goodness and to walk humbly with your God."
